English



<u>Familiar texts</u> about homes and families, e.g. "The Three Pigs" and "Little Red Hen". We will also use language to describe our own homes and homes in Barrasford. We will look at homes in Barrasford.

<u>Punctuation</u>: starting a sentence with a capital letter and ending with a full stop.

Handwriting: Letter heights and forming capital letters.

<u>Spelling</u>: Consonant, Vowels, and letter blends, e.g. sh, ch, st, th.

Revision of medial vowels.

Short 'oo', long 'oo', ai, ee.

We will be working on place value initially within 10, and extending to tens and ones numbers.

We will be sorting, counting, counting on from a larger group representing objects.

We will look at number words, initially to ten.

We will be counting on from any number, adding one more, and counting backwards from different numbers.

- 2. Each Monday, your child will take home a spelling book with a simple spelling pattern and a word of the week.

 There are lots of ways to learn spellings. Here are a few ideas:
 - Picture the word in your head. Say each letter aloud.
 - Write the word 2 or 3 times, sounding out the letters as you go.
 - Write the word in the air (without looking at the word) slowly.
 - Write the word on a piece of paper. Cut up each letter. Muddle it up. Then rearrange the letters into the correct order.
 - Magnetic letters are very useful because they are fun, colourful and motivate children to learn their spellings.

Talk about your home: How many rooms do you have? Which rooms do you do different things in, e.g. what happens in the kitchen? What does your house look like from the outside? Do you have a house number or name? What colour is your front door? How many rooms do you have? Think of the small things that only you know about as a family, e.g. a squeaky bathroom door, a mouse hole in the garden...

Look at photos of your child when they were a baby and toddler. How have they changed?

Please return the spelling book every Thursday - as we do a check on spellings and number work.
